



"This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. Greater love has no one than this, that someone lay down his life for his friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you." (John 15:12-14) (ESV)

### Love Makes Us Do It

A young girl was dying. Her only hope lay in a complete blood transfusion, but she had a very rare blood type. Only her bother, even younger than she, had the same type blood. His parents and doctors explained the situation to him, giving him time to ask questions. He agreed and, without delay, he was laid on a bed, the needle was pushed into his tiny vein, and slowly his blood seeped from his small body into the bag hanging from his bed. He lay quietly as the nurse stood next to him, ready to attend to any need he might have. "How do you feel?" she asked. "Ok," he answered, "but, Nurse, when do I die?"

What love this little boy had for his sister. What must he have thought when his own parents seemingly agreed, even asked him to sacrifice his life to save his sister's?

The boys' love for his sister can help us see how much Jesus loves us. Jesus suffered abuse, torture, persecution, and death for all of us. *"Greater love has no one than this, that He lay down His life for His friends"* (John 15:13). He demonstrated His tremendous love not because of our worthiness, but because He is

a God of tremendous love. Jesus' love for His heavenly Father and for us changed the world. Through His death and resurrection from that death, we through faith have received the forgiveness of our sins and life eternal. God's love to us in Christ is that power that enables us to love Him. *"We love because He first loved us"* (1 John 4:19).

The love of Jesus empowers us to be His stewards. Because of Jesus' love, we change from people giving to a need to people responding out of love. Certainly, we give to needs such as our church budget, Christian causes, and people, but our primary reason for giving is out of love and commitment to Jesus. When needs arise, Jesus opens our eyes and hearts so we can respond to those needs. However, our primary reason for giving is a desire to express our gratitude and thanksgiving for our Lord and the love that He shows us every day. Because our love for Jesus is our motivation for giving, our giving becomes joyful. Love changes our giving from an obligation to a privilege.

We live in difficult and changing times. How wonderful it is that, as Christians, we know that there is the certainty that Jesus always reaches out to us and loves us. May our lives and our giving genuinely reflect His love for us.

### **Prayer:**

Dear Jesus, my precious Savior, You demonstrated Your love for me in that, You did not spare even Your very own life in order that I may be reconciled to our Heavenly Father. May Your Spirit within me cause me to *"walk in Your statutes and...to obey Your rules."* Holy Spirit, empower me to respond to Your love and to grow in the character of Jesus, being generous and returning to my Father what already belongs to Him. In Jesus' name I pray. Amen.

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### ATTENTION ALL CONCORDIA UNIVERSITY STUDENTS!!

The congregation will now accept applications for student grants for the 2025-2026 academic year. All members of St. John's who plan to attend any of our seven synodical universities or our two seminaries are eligible to apply. All you have to do is send a brief note to St. John's Ev. Lutheran Church, ATTN: Tim Kramer, or an e-mail to

tkramer@stjohnsnapa.org, announcing your intent to enroll in the 2025-2026 academic year. All applications must include the following information:

- a) Your Name
- b) School Name
- c) Student ID or Account # (if returning student)
- d) Degree you are pursuing
- e) Year and Level of study (e.g. Junior year, Undergrad; 5<sup>th</sup> year, teacher certification, or student teaching; Graduate studies)
- f) Attending Fall Term or Spring Term (or both)
- g) Briefly explain why you're attending Concordia and how you plan to use your studies/future vocation to shine the light of Christ and to witness for Jesus as His kingdom representative in the world.

<u>Deadline for applications is March 31, 2025</u>. Actual grant amount to each student is undetermined but will be based, in part, upon the number of students requesting assistance. So, if you are considering attending a synodical university--*even if you have not made a final decision*--please send a brief note informing us of where you are in your decision process so that we can plan accordingly.

Our LCC K9 Comfort Dog Ministry has had an amazing impact on our own team members, but more importantly, in the Napa community and beyond. It is so important to continue serving in this way. We look forward to having you on the team!

Time to report on the harvests for 2024 . . . the harvest of fresh produce, and the harvest of dollars to support the growth of fresh produce in 2025.

First ... I am proud to report that the harvest of fresh produce totaled **19,292 lbs.** That's a bit south of our average, but then every year presents different growing challenges. It still is a very respectable contribution to the Food Bank this year.

Second . . . the harvest of dollars during November and December to tide us through the next crop season. We had two campaigns going on at the same time. We chose once again to participate in the CanDo Give!Guide 2024 campaign that helps us gain a wide exposure of our mission exposure into the community. Through our participation we received 44 donations from the community (plus a few

of our members too) totaling \$6,880. We will receive slightly less than that, since the cost of processing the credit card donations will be deducted. Even though we faced a lot of competition with over 67 organizations participating, our donations through Gift!Guide increased this year over last year by about 55%! That was exciting!

Now I don't have as yet the figure for how many donations and the total that our members gave during December through the regular offering channels. When that is received, the number will increase substantially. In addition to that, we also received recently a special grant from the Community Projects organization for \$10,000! That alone will help us cover our portion of the church's water bill.

God has been good blessing us with what we need to continue this work. We pray that he will also be blessing us with many volunteers this summer. Watch the next month's Vine for some information about joining the volunteer corps.

Please know that YOU matter to God and to the people at St. John's Lutheran Church. We have Stephen Ministers who are trained, ready, and willing to help. If you feel undeserving, know that God freely gives us every good and perfect gift through His amazing grace. By God's grace we can trust and confide in a Stephen Minister, start to heal, and become whole again.

### **Disability Etiquette**

The Disability Ministry space in *The Vine* will be used during **2025** to review key points of disability etiquette. The January article focused on <u>The Purpose of Disability Etiquette</u> and how to use <u>People-First</u> <u>Language</u>. If you missed the article, you can still find it on St. John's website.



Often people are not purposefully rude or disrespectful to people with disabilities; they just have not had the chance to learn how to interact in the most appropriate way. These articles are intended to get you thinking and understanding ways to adapt your behavior when needed. We know that true interpersonal skills develop through strong relationships. Use good judgment and ask heartfelt questions when interacting with people who have disabilities.

### **Ambulatory Impairments**

- Be aware of the environment. Make sure that people using mobility equipment have enough room to move freely.
- Speak directly to the person. Do not speak to others around them as if that person is not there. This is simple basic courtesy that should be given to everyone!
- Treat their wheelchair or walker as an extension of their body, their personal space. It is not something to lean on, sit on, hang things on, or touch without asking.
- Do not assume that the individual needs you to push his or her wheelchair. If the situation warrants it, you may ask if assistance is needed. Honor their answer.
- In a buffet line, you may ask if the person would like assistance. Offer to carry their plate or cup. Again, please honor their answer.
- When speaking with someone using a wheelchair, be mindful of how high you are relative to their eye level. Standing further away, sitting in a chair next to them, or even kneeling can help alleviate neck stress.
- Do not move crutches, walker, cane, or wheelchair without the person's permission. Do not leave the area without returning them to the person or arranging for their return.
- Do not talk about being confined or bound to a wheelchair. Wheels give the person freedom and are a welcomed means of mobility.
- In a situation when you need to help someone out of a wheelchair, set the brake and turn off any power controllers!
- Treasure your friendship!
